Statement

delivered by Mr. Emin Aslanov, First Secretary of the Permanent Mission of the Republic of Azerbaijan to the UN Office and other International Organizations in Geneva on behalf of the Non-Aligned Movement

Geneva, 19 June 2020

Madame President,

I have the honour to deliver this statement on behalf of the Non-Aligned Movement (NAM).

The Non-Aligned Movement views the general debate under Agenda Item 10 as an essential platform for States to share their visions and views to promote more effective technical cooperation and capacity-building in the field of human rights. It is also a good opportunity for States to share concrete experiences, challenges and information on assistance needed in the implementation of their human rights obligations and voluntary pledges and commitments, as well as the recommendations they have accepted in the Universal Periodic Review process.

The NAM recalls that providing advisory services and technical and financial assistance at the request of a State concerned and with a view to supporting its actions and programmes in the field of human rights is one of the responsibilities of the High Commissioner for Human Rights and her Office. Technical assistance and capacity-building also constitute an essential component of the work of the Human Rights Council.

The NAM emphasizes that the enhancement of international cooperation aimed at strengthening the capacity of States is essential for the effective promotion and protection of human rights and implementation of the 2030 Sustainable Development Agenda.

In this regard, the NAM is of the view that both the Human Rights Council and the Office of the High Commissioner for Human Rights should redouble their efforts in providing advisory services, capacity building and technical assistance to States upon their request and according to their national needs and priorities, to ensure the realization of all universally recognized human rights and fundamental freedoms.

In conclusion, we reiterate that all human rights, including the right to development, are universal, inalienable, indivisible, interdependent and interrelated. With this in mind, the technical cooperation and capacity-building activities by the Human Rights Council and the Office of the High Commissioner for Human Rights should have an equal focus on civil, political, economic, social and cultural rights.
